From the Pastor

Things that make for peace: Helping our Neighbor

There are many aspects to Christian peacemaking. At the heart of them all is relationship and community. Loving God and loving one another naturally lead to peace in all its forms.

In October our Shalom Team led us in a Peace Sunday worship where we were invited to consider the long history of Christian peacemaking and declare our lives as Christian peacemakers with a statement that "Hate Has No Home Here."

The brilliance of the statement "Hate Has No Home Here" is that it is both a <u>personal</u> and <u>communal</u> declaration. It is both an <u>intention</u> as well as a <u>rejection</u> of the things that are not peace and love. I have been humbled and encouraged by your response to this endeavor. Many have taken home signs to declare their intention to be people of love and peace. Many are reading about how to be God's people of love in Bob Goff's book *Everybody Always*. Loving our neighbor <u>is</u> making peace!

One of the aspects of loving others or peacemaking is helping people in need: reaching out to the most vulnerable and empowering them with the things they need to survive. One of the ways Saint Stephen does this is through the Open Arms mission. By coming up alongside people in crisis or who are hungry we declare that God is a God of abundance and that we are called to share that abundance with everyone.

I have regular conversation with Marytherese Ambacher, the Director at Open Arms. One of the questions I often ask is what is needed most now. For many years we specifically collected diapers and wipes. Catholic charities is now helping to provide diapers through a special fund. Sheila Eisen, one of our devoted Open Arms volunteers, and Marytherese have stated that one of the biggest needs currently for Open Arms is bar soap and personal hygiene items like shampoo & conditioner, deodorant, toothpaste toothbrushes, and feminine hygiene products. We will always collect and deliver any food or hygiene item to Open Arms. So please keep bringing items in—there's a blue collection basket by the office. We can focus our collection efforts more specifically on bar soap and hygiene items


in order to help fill a gap at Open Arms. Any size is fine as some individuals without storage capacity only need the hotel sizes and other households with large numbers can use the larger sizes.

You can always volunteer to help fill orders at Open Arms. Volunteers are always needed. You can join our team of volunteers from Saint Stephen on the 4th Thursday of the month from 4:30-6:30pm.

When people are well fed and feel they can care for and groom their bodies appropriately their self worth and dignity increases. At least I know mine does! When people have self-esteem and dignity they can be the people God has made them to be. These are the things that make for peace...God's work that we can be a part of in our community.





A 0.7-mile section of the Millennium Trial runs along the western edge of the preserve. Other public access improvements to the 500-acre preserve include toilets, a 0.8-mile gravel loop trail (background in photo) and four scenic overlooks. See the restored North Mill Creek (foreground in photo), no longer dammed up as the former Rasmussen Lake.1.5 miles total.

"United Way of Lake County is proud to fulfill this decades-long vision, joining with the Lake County government and our many community partners to deliver a best-in-class, robust solution for Lake County—the largest county in Illinois to implement 211."

- Experienced, trained resource navigators/specialists at the 211 contact center will guide you to the help you need.
- The comprehensive 211 service is multi-lingual with English and Spanish-speaking staff, as well as interpretations to more than 150 languages.

"United Way of Lake County's new 211 service is a huge asset for Lake County, offering an efficient, safe, and confidential place where community members can instantly get access to the resources and information they need," said Megan McKenna, Director of Strategy & Development at Mano a Mano Family Resource Center, in the release. "Mano a Mano is honored to have been part of the planning process and grateful to United Way of Lake County for its leadership on this project."

211 also helps service providers find the right solution in one call, which helps reduce the time agencies spend redirecting calls to other agencies and more time addressing needs of their own clients, the release said. In turn 211 reduces the ultimate cost of services and makes sure money is spent most efficiently over time, United Way of Lake County added.
